Letter to grammar school heads

Comprehensive Future sent a letter to the Grammar School Heads Association. The heads met Justine Greening and officials from the Department for Education and a summary of the meeting included the comment:

'Ministers and officials agree with us that there are a lot of people, who are philosophically opposed to selection, who keep saying it damages the education of other pupils but present little or no evidence to support this claim.'

We sent a letter outlining 14 pieces of evidence to disprove their point, and the letter can be read in full at our website.

The reply by Jim Skinner, the GSHA CEO, was not so detailed. It simply said: *'Thank you for your letter. We note the references you have cited and the conclusions you have drawn from them.'*

Moving to greater use of email
